Cooke County Crop and Cattle Report for Monday, May 27, 2019

Well today is Memorial Day where we remember all those that gave the ultimate sacrifice for our freedom and way of life. I haven't heard too many complaints tho, and I'm sure not complaining. We fertilized our grass demonstration plot we are doing with NCTC and NRCS on Thursday. The trucks were running in water on one end of the field, but we got it completed. Thanks to Tony's Seed and Feed and Red River Co-op for their help in getting this trial fertilized and thanks to the college for allowing us to use a good coastal field for a test plot. <u>In the markets as of May 25-</u> Slaughter cattle trade \$3 lower at \$115. Current feed yard closeouts were \$88 in the red. The live cattle futures for June were steady at \$111, while Aug Feeder futures were \$2 lower at \$143. The cash prices here in Texas for 750 lb feeder steers were up \$1 at \$1.35 and 550 lb. stocker steers were up \$3 at \$1.65. Average dress slaughter cows were steady to \$5 higher at \$56-65, while bulls were \$1-4 higher at \$71-89

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
